PASTOR'S BLURB FOR AUGUST 2023

'... be of sin the double cure, cleanse me from its guilt and power.' So ends the first verse of the beloved hymn Rock of Ages. Most of us know the gospel, and could encapsulate the good news with the well-known illustration: 'A judge finds you guilty, and sentences you to paying a huge fine. A rich person who loves you pays the fine, and you can go free.' (Some illustrations have the judge paying the fine. In other illustrations, you are sentenced to death, but a wondrous loving person takes the execution for you, and you can go free, and so on). Those popular stories illustrate the first half of the gospel. They illuminate the first phrase of Toplady's hymn: 'cleanse me from its *quilt*.' But I am interested in the second half of the line: 'cleanse from its power'. It is an infinite blessing to be cleansed from sin's guilt, even if the guilt was the only thing that you were cleansed from. To be free to go. To be free from the destiny of hell. What an infinite blessing. But what about being free from sin's power? Ever since God said to Cain, 'Sin is crouching at the door. It desires to have you, but you must rule over it,' mankind has been held in sin's power. New Year's resolutions to give up bad habits, turning over new leafs, going on anger-management courses – all of it is of very limited value indeed. That is because the natural person is a 'slave to sin' (John 8:34). But the astoundingly good news is that once you put your faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, you are *united* to Him. That means that, because of God's divine magnanimity, God makes you a partaker of everything that Christ has done. Jesus lived a perfect life. God imputes that perfect life to your account, so that your heavenly Father views you as having the perfect righteousness of His Son. Christ died. God makes you a partaker in His Son's death. I'll return to this in a minute. Jesus rose from the dead. God makes you a partaker in Jesus's resurrection. And because Jesus will never die again, you will never die again. That's why we rejoice as Christians. But I very much desire to turn your attention to the middle transaction that I mentioned a moment ago. Because Christ died, God very kindly made you a partaker in Christ's death. And I want very much to urge you, best beloved, to realize that fact, and dwell upon that fact, and celebrate that fact every bit as much as you realize, dwell upon, and celebrate the fact that because Christ lives eternally, you live eternally. Because this is the secret to realizing and enjoying freedom from sin's enslavement. When we were baptized, our 'burial' in the water symbolized burial with Christ. God (by His Spirit) very kindly put your old sinful nature to death, and something that has died has not got the power to enslave you anymore. Isn't that a mightily wonderful truth? You don't *have to* be lazy. You don't *have to* be greedy. You don't have to lust. You don't have to be resentful. You don't even have to be scared of what people will think of you. Let us rejoice in what, I suspect, is a much underrated transaction that God gave to us, and pay ever more attention to the fact that we have been buried with Christ. Then rejoice as you realize an increasing freedom from those old sinful practices. And rejoice when you hear Jesus say to you, 'Neither do I condemn you. Go and sin no more.' because you know that you will be able to obey Hm

The Story behind the Hymns History of Hymns: 'What a Friend we have in Jesus' Source: Chat GPT

The hymn "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" has a touching story behind its creation. The lyrics were written by Joseph M. Scriven, an Irish poet and hymnist, in the mid-19th century.

"What a Friend We Have in Jesus" has since become one of the most well-known and beloved hymns in the Christian tradition. It continues to offer comfort and encouragement to people around the world, reminding them of the unwavering love and friendship of Jesus Christ.

From the desk of Bobby Schuller:

Yesterday I shared that we often fail to understand the God-given power of the mind and the spirit being much more powerful than our bodies. Today I want to reinforce this truth! Whenever I write my sermons, I put on a farmer's hat, grab a clipboard, paper, a pen, and prayerfully write down what comes to me. After I have thought about what I want to say, I begin to prepare. First, I study the scripture, and then I go out into the field, which is the Back Bay Nature Preserve. I walk and pray that the Lord will tell me what to share.

Recently as I was preparing my sermon, I saw a senior gentleman during my walk. We greeted one another as he stared pensively over the water. My clipboard caught his eye and he asked about it. "I'm writing a sermon. I'm a pastor." And he replied, "I'm a pastor too, a retired pastor who performs burials at sea for all types of faiths." We exchanged ideas, and he shared some amazing experiences. He noted that for Christian funerals there was an agreement of the afterlife in Heaven. But now performing burials at sea, he often witnesses the power of hope and despair. Despair is the idea that the greatest things in your life are behind you and not in front of you. And of course, hope and faith are the opposite — and there's power in this.

Friend, as we age, as we face injury and illness, we should remember that our bodies are precious to God. We should love our bodies and take care of them. But at the end of the day, let me encourage you that the God-given mind and spirit are much more powerful!
