PASTOR'S BLURB FOR JULY 2023

'I daresay it won't matter in a hundred years from now'. That's what my father used to say when the members of our family were getting beside ourselves at some problem which, it seemed to us, was in danger of precipitating the end of the world. That saying of Dad's always seemed to calm me down. No, it won't greatly matter in a hundred years from now. Dad's quiet assertion had the effect of causing us to step back and get things in perspective. I want to share three examples of biblical characters who had the knack of stepping back and getting things in perspective. 1. David was in the Palestinian desert, hiding out, sleeping in caves, eluding King Saul who was out for his blood. He (David) was feeling sorry for himself in Psalm 13: 'How long, o Lord? Will you forget me forever?' (Psalm 13:1). But then David steps back, reminds himself of the main thing, which was that Lord loved him and meant good to him. This realization greatly cheered him: 'I will sing the Lord's praise, for He has been good to me'. Nothing external happened to David from the beginning of the psalm to the end, but he had mastered the art of stepping back and reminding himself of the great realities. He had brought himself from despair to song, just by stepping back and reminding himself of the Lord's love for him. 2. Habakkuk was feeling sorry for himself too. He complains: 'How long, o Lord, must I call for help, but you do not listen?' (Habukkuk 1:2). He was lamenting the continued propensity of the wicked to flourish and prosper. Then Habakkuk did the wise thing. He stepped back, took a deep breath, and recovered his perspective. And then he said, 'The Lord is in his holy temple. Let all the earth be silent before him.' (Habakkuk 2:20). Then the prophet went from being calm and peaceful, to positively exultant: 'Though the fig tree does not bud and there are no grapes on the vines, though the olive crop fails, and the fields produce no food, though there are no sheep in the pen and no cattle in the stalls, yet will I rejoice in the Lord, I will be joyful in God my Saviour (Habakkuk 3:17-18). What a result from merely stepping back and reminding himself of the main things: that God is good, and worthy to be praised regardless of any circumstances surrounding him. Joy in the face of a difficult situation.

3. Job lost all his cattle, his servants and his ten children in one fell swoop. After much internal conflict, he too, took a step back, and reminded himself of the main things: that God is good, regardless of circumstances, and is worthy to be praised even the whole world is collapsing around one's shoulders. That is why Job said, 'Though he slay me, I will put my trust in him.' (Job 13:15).

Brothers and sisters, try and develop the habit of stepping back and reminding yourself of the big picture: God is in charge. He loves you. He knows exactly what you are going through. He won't let you go through an inch more than He knows you can handle. And the big picture is that whatever you are going through now will work out for your ultimate good and God's ultimate glory. Step back, and hear the words of my father, 'I don't suppose it will matter all that much in a hundred years from now.'

The Story behind the Hymns History of Hymns: 'The Church is One Foundation' Source: Chat GPT

"The Church's One Foundation" is a popular hymn with a rich history. It was written by Samuel John Stone, an Anglican clergyman and hymn writer, in the mid-19th century. Stone composed the hymn in response to a controversy within the Church of England regarding the doctrine of the Church.

"The Church's One Foundation" was first published in Stone's collection of hymns called "Lyra Fidelium" in 1866. Over time, it gained popularity and became widely sung in churches around the world. The hymn's enduring message of unity and faith in Christ continues to resonate with Christians today, serving as a reminder of the Church's foundation and purpose.
